This past week marked the 80th anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz concentration camp in Poland by the Red Army. After years of imprisonment and the death of 1.1 million Jews, the killing had finally stopped.

At ceremonies marking the anniversary, officials of the museum at Auschwitz repeatedly said it was important to remember the horror of Auschwitz. For in forgetting, we run the risk of events like this happening again. That museum is the repository of that awful memory.

It's good to remember—the good things and the bad. Moses said to the Israelites in Deuteronomy 4:9, "Be careful and watch yourselves closely so that you do not forget the things your eyes have seen or let them slip from your hearts as long as you live."

Marking anniversaries is a way for us to not forget the significant moments of our journeys. They inform, they teach, and they shape the present and our future.

Did you know that 2025 is the 40th anniversary of the founding of Farragut Presbyterian Church? Two small Presbyterian congregations united to form a welcoming presence in the heart of this then-new town. Based on great hospitality and a commitment to being a voice for God's grace and love, FPC embodied what it means to grow in faith together amid diversity of thought and belief.

Outreach Giving 2024

Each year, our Outreach Committee gives ten percent of our annual giving to local, regional, and international causes. This is in addition to the various special offerings/fundraisers and giving done by groups within the church (men's group, Presbyterian Women, etc.)

In 2024, \$70,065 was awarded from just the outreach budget alone. Here is where the money was allocated:

Please join Presbyterian Women as we help stock the Sunset Gap food pantry during this season of high unemployment. In October the pantry served 565 families, 2542 people, and in November they served 520 families (only open 3 weeks) for 2340 people.

Items most needed include flour, sugar, cornmeal mix, cooking oil, peanut butter, pasta & canned pasta sauce, canned meat, rice, mac & cheese, breakfast items, Ramen noodles and crackers. Music at FPC Dr. Angela Batey, Director

Worship is a time for celebration and contemplation as a community of Christian faith. Through song and prayer, through silence and the spoken word, through sharing Communion at the table of Christ, we remember that we are children of God. In gathering as a community, opening the book of God's Word, proclaiming it aloud, and reflecting on its meaning, we engage in a communal encounter with the divine.

It would seem as if music has always been associated with worship. We read in Psalm 71: 'I will also praise thee with the harp for thy faithfulness, O my God; I will sing praises to thee with the lyre, O Holy One of Israel. My lips will shout for joy, when I sing praises to thee' and this brings out the close association between the act of making music and the act of giving praise to God. We know from Acts that when Paul and Silas were imprisoned at Philippi they 'were praying and singing hymns to God' which presumably acted to help them sustain their faith.

Music is something that reaches very deeply within us as human beings. We can quite literally be moved to tears by a particular melody. Music has developed its own language that can be used to express a vast emotional vocabulary.

Here are some of the ideas we as church musicians consider:

- In singing together, or in making music together, a particular group fosters its corporate identity and songs can develop a sense of fellowship. What we have then is a medium that has profound links to our humanity, in all its aspects: emotional, intellectual, spiritual. It is unsurprising that music has always been part of worship in any community. How will these words and music speak most directly to my particular congregation?
- How can I help our community worship more completely? What does the text of each song want in sound and tempo? Where in the liturgy does each musical instance fall? What comes before and what comes next? How can I help prepare the congregation to embrace the focus and flow of worship?
- What are they most likely to remember Monday morning? Music has staying power that text alone rarely enjoys. People do not forget the way a hymn, song, or anthem connected with a deeper reality.

Tami and I have been blessed to be part of the Farragut Presbyterian Church community for 25 and 27 years, respectfully. Through your love and nurture we have been committed to serving Christ in your midst, called to be your musicians, to help you worship with your community, and send you out into the world singing a song on your heart.

On December 15 you so graciously celebrated Tami and I for our service here at FPC. We want to thank Pastor Matt for your enduring love and care, and the privilege to work with you each week. Thank you to Dawn, Sandra, Mason, and Lori for not only being terrific colleagues but for being great friends as well. It is an honor to serve with you. Thank you to the FPC Chancel Choir, Farragut Ringers, and a host of talented musicians who give of their best to worship. Without each of you we could not be able to do what we do. Thank you to the group who planned and put together the wonderful celebration. From Pastor Matt's humbling words, the FABULOUS reception, and the hugs, love and gifts...you truly made us feel so special. We look forward to many more years of serving with you. May we continue to get "lost in wonder, love, and praise."



THE FPC SHEPHERD PROGRAM IS NOW UNDERWAY!

With our Shepherd program, each of you (and your family) have been assigned a Shepherd Leader. Your Shepherd Leader is a member of our congregation who has volunteered to contact you every month – to see how you are doing, if you have needs that we as a church could perhaps help with, and to ask how they can be praying for you!

We are blessed to have 30 Shepherd Leaders who have felt called to help in this ministry. Each Shepherd Leader has approximately 5-7 families within their "flock". Your Shepherd Leader will contact you each month in the way that is best for you, be it a phone call, card, email, or by text. Or perhaps you have an opportunity to see each other at church or in the community and can share at that time.



Our hope is that this program will offer an additional way within our congregation for everyone to feel cared for and prayed for, connected and valued, and to have opportunities to build relationships. We also understand and want to respect each member's boundaries and need for privacy at whatever level he or she is comfortable. A big thank you to all our caring Shepherd leaders! We appreciate you all very much!

Our vision with this program is the 23rd Psalm – Jesus is our Shepherd! – and we hope that all in our church family feel cared for by each other, as Jesus cares for us!

SESSION

At its meeting on January 27, the Session:

- Approved Lisa Gary to serve as Clerk of Session, Tom Koch to serve as financial secretary, and John Begovich to serve as church treasurer in 2025.
- Endorsed a process called Vision 2035, led by John Sharp, to assist the Session in charting a course for effective ministry into the next decade. The process will involve getting feedback from key leaders on our church's strengths and weaknesses, as well as opportunities for growth.
- Entered into an agreement with a company called MultiVista for 3D laser scanning services to assist our architect, Brewer Ingram Fuller, in providing possible designs for improvements to the sanctuary and narthex areas as part of Fresh Look II.
- Accepted a recommendation of the Administration Committee to designate the church's 2024 surplus (\$94,000) to several areas, including our capital reserves and Fresh Look II.
- Approve the hiring of a third nursery worker as a substitute on Sunday mornings
