

The Youth Sunday School Class meets to DIVE IN to the Old Testament! Each week throughout the school year, youth explore a specific book of the Old Testament utilizing videos and discussion. We will explore key themes like God's covenant with the Israelites, stories of pivotal figures like Abraham, Moses, David, and Daniel, learning about concepts of obedience, faith, justice, and redemption, while also examining how these stories and characters relate to their own lives and challenges today, especially through relatable experiences like dealing with difficult choices, facing adversity, and navigating relationships with others; all while understanding the historical context of the stories and how they foreshadow the coming of Jesus in the New Testament.

The Revised Common Lectionary is a three-year cycle of readings from the Scriptures, arranged and intended for proclamation during the worship of the people of God. ## Posies for the Pantry Annual Fundraiser benefitting Shepherd of Hope Food Pantry

Five local Farragut churches are supporting the 6<sup>th</sup> annual Posies for the Pontry Fundraiser at Farragut Presbyterian Church, 209 Jamestowne Blvd., on Saturday, April 12<sup>th</sup> between 9am and 1pm. Their hope is that the community will come and purchase spring flowers, plants, and herbs to help



support the Shepherd of Hope Food Pantry located in Faith Lutheran Church. Besides beautiful flowers and plants, *Posies for the Pantry* will also feature multiple craft vendors, a "Bargain Shed" of gently-used garden tools and décor, and free crafts for the kids.

The Shepherd of Hope Food Pantry strives to assist and serve those who are experiencing food insecurity. No person is turned away from receiving nourishing food from the pantry. Their mission is to Love God, Love Others and Serve. As previously mentioned, the pantry is a ministry of five



mentioned, the pantry is a ministry of five faith-based organizations: Faith Lutheran Church, Concord United Methodist Church, Farragut Presbyterian Church, First Baptist Concord Church, and Grassy Valley Baptist Church. Through the generosity of the pantry partners, local businesses, church members, and over 100 volunteers, the pantry served a total of 5,282 people in our community during 2024. The need continues to grow over the years. The "Urban Table" food truck will also be onsite to purchase delicious breakfast sandwiches and other food items to benefit KARM (Knox Area Rescue Ministries.) Since 1960, KARM has helped men and women struggling with homelessness, poverty, mental health and addiction.

The Role of Silence in Worship

The apostles gathered around Jesus and reported to him all they had done and taught. Then, because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, he said to them, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest." So they went away by themselves in a boat to a solitary place. —Mark 6:30-32

Southwest Airlines once had an ad campaign known simply as "Wanna get away?" Of course we do! We can all reap benefits by stepping away from the buzz and din of the world. The getaway I'm referring to is not the tropical island vacation of a lifetime. No, this one is available to you right now, wherever you are. No planes, packing, or prepping. It's giving ourselves permission to step away to a quiet place with Jesus at our side. Jesus understood the necessity of quiet. We can gain so much by unplugging from the world, relinquishing our perceived sense of control, and listening to what God has to say to us.

Musicians particularly can identify with both Mozart and Debussy, both of whom explored the idea that music is often found in the silence between the notes. John Cage's infamous 4'33" highlights just how uncomfortable and out of sorts we are with silence.

Being silent is a challenge in our world. Society encourages us to be constantly connected, taking great pains to hardwire us to visual and aural stimulation. From 24/7 streaming platforms to doctor's office waiting rooms, elevators, grocery stores, and restaurants, music and videos as a commodity bombards our senses everywhere we turn. I recently traveled to adjudicate a choral festival. I was amazed at how many people arrived at the performance space with airpods or other types of headphones connected to their phones or other devices to stream music and/or videos, addicted, if you will, to this technology-induced stimulation through screens large and small.

In preparing to rehearse and conduct music, I spend a good deal of time silently reviewing music scores. I review the music, measure by measure, page by page, following the rise and fall of the melodic lines, the interweaving and shifting of harmonies, listening for all of this in my mind's ear. Each of us can foster inner listening where music resonates on a spiritual level. Our stillness allows us to cultivate a deeper understanding and appreciation of music.

Church musicians are tasked with providing glorious music in worship. We work diligently to provide music that is our very best, polished and gleaming with beauty, crafted with excellence. While we are so focused on the act of creating sound, perhaps we all would do well to make more space for being silent in worship. In doing so we can move beyond the notes and rhythms and other sounds in worship and take the opportunity to create a closer connection with God.

The passage from Mark listed above is not the only time Jesus embraced silence. We read in Luke 4 that at the beginning of his ministry, Jesus went into the wilderness alone, praying and fasting for 40 days and nights. This was time spent apart and in deep communion with God. In Matthew 26, after the Last Supper, Jesus went with his disciples to Gethsemane, imploring them to watch and pray while he gathered strength for the difficult journey ahead.

Stillness in worship gives us time to truly listen to all the ambient sounds around us. The sound of water being poured from the pitcher into the font. The silence of prayer. These moments can often produce an inner voice of calm which allows for deeper connection to the texts found in choral music, the beauty of instrumental musical lines, and to the One for whom they were written.

Stillness in sacred worship provides inspiration and encourages reflection by reserving space to contemplate faith and our relationship with God. When we are still within ourselves, we are more attuned to one another and to the still, small voice of God whispering within. The psalmist knew the best way to do this is to "Be still, and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10).

Next time you are in worship at FPC, look for those moments of silence and stillness. You will find God there.





## **SESSION HIGHLIGHTS**

At its meeting on March 24, the Session:

- Endorsed Horizon 2035, a deliberate plan to grow FPC from a pastoral-sized to a program-sized congregation (one with an average worship attendance of more than 150). Since we are in a position of strength, the Session views now as the time to intentionally take steps to strengthen our viability for the future and live into God's call for our life as a worshiping community. Steps to enact this plan will be developed and implemented in the coming weeks and months. More information will be provided to the congregation as the way becomes clearer.
- Approved the replacement of the two exterior narthex doors nearest the back parking lot, along with automatic door openers. The current doors are no longer able to reliably lock, posing a security risk.
